A PRIESTHOOD WITHOUT END: TO BE HOLY AS GOD IS HOLY

In both the Old and New Testaments a priest is a servant ordained by God to lead the community in its worship (Exodus 29). The chosen people regarding worship as vital to their well-being. They knew they needed God's ongoing presence in their midst in order to thrive (Numbers 28-29). The challenge of staying in right relationship with God is expressed in the Lord's exhortation: "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy" (Leviticus 19:2). The priest has a special responsibility to distinguish between what is holy and what is profane, or "ordinary" (Leviticus 10:10-11). The priest's primary role is to lead the community in giving thanks to God by offering sacrifice. The people bring the first fruits of their harvest to the priest at the sanctuary, and the priest then offers them to God (Deuteronomy 26:1-10). As we know well, giving someone a gift is an important way of strengthening a relationship. The material gift points beyond itself to the relationship between the receiver and the gift-giver. The ordained priest is authorized to lead the community's symbolic rituals in which the divine life is shared with the community. Such participation in the divine life transforms the community and makes it holy. When a community sins deliberately or inadvertently and then repents, the priest is there to offer purification offerings or sin offerings to plead for reconciliation with God (Leviticus 4-5; 16).

The destruction of the **Temple of Solomon in 586 BC and the Second Temple in AD 70** eliminated the place in which sacrifices could be offered. The priests taught that the destruction in 586 came about because the chosen people had compromised the centrality of their relationship with the Lord. With the rebuilding of the Temple in 515 BC and the restoration of its sacrificial system, the Judeans increased their purification sacrifices or sin offerings to appeal to the Lord for forgiveness for any and all collective and individual sins. They wanted to address any defilement or sin that might lead to the Lord's withdrawal from the community. But with the destruction of the Second Temple, this priestly sacrificial system and its way of sustaining the divine-human relationship was thrust into crisis. The **Letter to the Hebrews**, probably written in the 80's (not long after the destruction of the Second Temple), teaches how **Jesus is the new high priest**. He replaces the former sacrificial system based on animal sacrifice and grain offerings with a new, more interiorized spiritual form of sacrificial worship (7:23-27; 9:1-14). When Jesus was raised from the dead and seated at the Father's right hand, he was identified as a priest according to the order of Mechizedek (5:5-6; Ps 110:4). This priestly line has no beginning and will

have no end. The interceding and reconciling by Jesus as he entered the heavenly sanctuary will go on day after day. Through his passion and death Jesus accepts fully the human condition of suffering as a form of training or discipline to give an example to his followers of how to become exclusively faithful to the Father (2:10, 18; 5:7-10). Jesus' sacrificial gift of his own body and blood on our behalf strengthens us and instructs us on how to be holy as God is holy (10:10, 19-25).

Each of us, I believe, should at intervals restudy his acitivities and redefine his goals. At times, a person ought to appraise carefully what he is doing and ask himself the question. "Why am I doing this?" We do our work each day, and maybe we do it the best we can. But why are you doing that particular work? What are your objectives, your goals? Could you tell me what your goal is? Or is it fuzzy, hazy? We need to sharpen our thinking and bring our goals into focus.

Life Lifter: You can reach your goal, your best dream can come true, you can get where you want to go – only if you know what your goal is. Be somebody. Practice the principle of the possible (Matthew 17:20).

Palm Sunday: Jesus' Triumphal Entry to Jerusalem

Palm Sunday is the Christian holiday that occurs on the Sunday before Easter. This celebration commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, mentioned in each of the four Gospels. Palm Sunday in the Bible Jesus Comes to Jerusalem as King – The Triumphal Entry

Now when they drew near to Jerusalem and came to Bethphage, the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says

anything to you, you shall say, 'The Lord needs them,' and he will send them at once." This took place to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet saying, "Say to the daughter of Zion, 'Behold, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and put on them their cloaks, and he sat on them. Most of the crowd spread the cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" And when he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up, saying "Who is this?" And the crowds said, "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth of Galilee." Matthew 21:1-11
