NORMAN GLICK



Norman Newton Glick was born on March 10, 1907, in Utah. He arrived in Empire at the age of 17 on July 11, 1924, with his parents, David and Ida and his brothers Earl and Royal. He graduated from Modesto High School in 1926 and married Hannah Frances Barrett in 1927. They had two children John David (currently residing in Virginia) and Virginia of Turlock. Mr. and Mrs. Glick were

very active in the Empire Church of the Brethren and both of their children became pastors.

Mr. Glick was a member of the Stanislaus County Board of Education for 40 years, retiring in 1985. A longtime resident of Empire, he served as an Empire Union School District Trustee for ten years. It was Mr. Glick's life-long dedication to education that prompted District Trustees to name our middle school in his honor.

Prior to opening his own accounting firm, Mr. Glick was an accountant for Bank of America, Modesto Irrigation District, and the Stanislaus County Clerk's Office. He was a member of the Empire Lions Club, the YMCA Men's Club, Heifer Project International, and the Salvation Army. Mr. Glick lived in Empire until the last three years of his life and was a member of the planning committee for Glick Middle School before his death in the month of October in the year 2000. Mr. Glick was 93 years old.

<u>5 THINGS YOU NEVER KNEW ABOUT DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME</u> By Michele Berger, March 09, 2016

1. You can thank Benjamin Franklin

Benjamin Franklin gets the credit for coming up with Daylight Saving Time, according to Fred Espenak of NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center. "The basic idea is to make the best use of daylight hours by shifting the clock forward in the spring and backward in the fall," he wrote.

Official timekeeper for the United States, the National Institute of Standards and Technology, puts it another way: Going from standard Time to DST, which happens during spring, essentially moves an hour of daylight from morning to night. The reverse happens in autumn, NIST writes. "The transition [back] from DST to ST effectively moves one hour of daylight from the evening to the morning."

2. Daylight Saving Time began after WWI

After World War I, the practice of moving clocks began, and in the mid-1960s, President Lyndon Johnson signed a law for when DST would start and end, making its duration from the final Sunday in April to the final Sunday of October. In 2007, a new law by the Bush Administration extended DST by a month, starting it in March instead of April. (That makes it DST about 65 percent of the calendar year, according to NIST.)

3. Not all states practice Daylight Saving Time

States can opt out by passing a law, Espenak notes, and a couple have done so. Currently, Hawaii and Arizona (except in Navajo Indian territories) don't change their clocks, nor do American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico or the Virgin Islands.

4. Spring Forward can mess with your health

Studies have shown the time change can impact your body in several ways, from worsening motor skills to mood swings and sluggish memory. A sleep study in Europe found night owls have a particularly hard time adjusting their body clocks to the actual clock.

5. Generally, Americans wish it would end


According to one poll, many Americans don't think DST is worth the hassle or that it saves any energy – one of the main arguments for the switch several years ago. There's a proposal from Quartz magazine to do away with the practice altogether, and instead divide the U.S. into just two time zones an hour apart. There's another from Universe Today, which covers space and is touting the hashtag #DownWithDST.

For now, at least, it's here to stay. Don't forget to adjust your clocks.


