LIVING A SURRENDERED LIFE

Since the world does its best to make us surrender to it, how about we surrender to God first and have a blessed 2022? In that vein, let me share some thoughts by Dr. Charles Stanley.

To the best of your knowledge, are you fully surrendered to Jesus Christ?

He is our savior and Lord and surrendering is our reasonable act of worship.

A surrendered life begins at salvation.

When Jesus is our savior we acknowledge Him as Lord God and we realize that He is the Lord of all we have and do. Surrendering to God includes every area of our lives. But this absolute surrender is what God expects because Christ died for us and we belong to Him.

Full surrender is God's perfect will for our lives.

God will take care of what ever is holding you back from complete surrendering if you but ask him to do so.

Jesus Christ is the perfect example of full surrender.

He always did the will of his father who sent him no matter how difficult it was. The distress that Jesus experienced when going to the cross, demonstrates that surrender is not always easy and can be excruciating, yet He never wavered from complete obedience to His Father's will.

This same kind of attitude we should have, not my will, but Yours be done.

Surrender is not defeat but victory over whatever is hindering our Christian life. Allow God to search us and reveal any areas we have kept for ourselves. Once we have trusted Jesus as our

savior we must recognize that we now belong to Him. Full surrender is like opening the closets of our lives and inviting Him to clean out whatever he wants.

What does it mean to yield ourselves to God? It requires that we open our hearts and lives to the Lord, asking Him to take out whatever does not please Him. We must be willing to confess, repent, walk away, give it up, and lay it down. Until we do, we will never become the person He wants us to be or enjoy His blessings.

What would happen if we gave ourselves fully to God? He delights to work in our lives when we recognize Him as Lord. Such surrender affects our prayers, generosity, conversations, attitudes, families, workplace, and interactions with those who don't know Christ.

How would God respond if we yielded ourselves to Him? We fear surrendering because we think we will lose something, but we gain much more than we might lose. In surrendering we begin a closer walk with Him. The Christian life is living under the leadership of the Lord Jesus, who always does what is best.

What is hindering total surrender? Look into yourself and find what is holding you back. We never lose by yielding to the Lord, in fact, that is when life at its best begins.

What changes do we need to make? Stop rationalizing and excusing our lack of submission to God. Trust God. He only does what is best and always keeps His word. Remember that the safest place to be is in subjection to Him. Surrender today and every day because it is a lifelong practice that will continue until we meet the Lord in heaven.

POSITIVE INSIGHTS

"But I must die in this land, I must not go over Jordan: but ye shall go over, and possess that good land. Take heed unto yourselves, lest ye forget the covenant of the Lord your God, which he made with you, and make you a graven image, or likeness of any thing, which the Lord they God hath forbidden thee. For the Lord thy God is a consuming fire, even a jealous God." Deuteronomy 4:22-24

Now just what does the process of praying do to you that relieves you of worry? One thing it does is release and activate your built-in strength. Every one of us has more strength by far than he ever dreamed of. Have you ever used all your strength? ALL of it? No, you have never used one-half your strength, nor have I. I'll go further and say that I doubt that any of us has ever used one-tenth of his strength. We have tremendous reservoirs of power that we could call into action if we wanted to. I don't know but that the greatest achievement in life is to know how to continually break out from yourself the strength that is there. You pray the strength out, you believe it out, you practice it out. And then the worry fades away. It is amazing the strength people have – that J have.

Life Lifter: If power isn't coming through, find the block and remove it. Always poke around a problem, looking for its soft spot, for nearly every problem has one. Then break the problem open and find the solution.

For years, I've studied the symbol of New Year's . . . a smiling baby wearing a diaper and a top hat. What does it mean? A beginning of life? A time of innocence? A scenario for change? Then it hit me. For years, I've been over dressed for the new year.

The hair shirt of self-pity is uncomfortable, but for years has provided me with enough ammunition to bring tears to the eyes of my husband and children. To discard it would be unthinkable. After all, self-pity, if you do it right, takes a long time to amass.

The belt of prejudice is an old one and encompasses anyone who does not agree with every single word I have ever said. I'd feel naked without it.

The large footlocker contains anger. True, a lot of it doesn't fit anymore, but I hang onto it just in case I'm caught short.

Adorning all of this are the jewels of frustration over things that I can never do anything about, but which I wear like medals to torture myself.

And of course, the biggest piece of baggage contains old grudges that I shift through each year like old photographs and pressed flowers . . . the critic who was unkind . . . the one mistake from a friend I want to forgive . . . the trust I gave as a child that was abused . . . the harsh words from a family member that I refuse to forget. Grudges, many of them antiques, that I plan on handing down to my children.

Each year of my life, the load gets heavier and heavier to carry into a new year. Once around March, I almost sank, but stubbornly I hung onto every bit of New Years past.

Frankly, I don't know if I can face a new year without my clothes on. I don't know if I can check in without luggage. Can I look at old friends and see them for the first time? Can I keep my eyes forward and not look back? Do I have the guts to emerge with nothing on but a smile and a top hat?

I am going to try.
